People Food


Avoid feeding your pets:

- Alcohol
- Avocado
- Chocolate
- Coffee or Caffeine
- Citrus
- Coconut and Coconut Oil
- Grapes and Raisins
- Dairy, inscluding milk
- Nuts, including macademia, almonds pecans and walnuts
- Onions, Garlic and Chives
- Raw and Undercooked Meat, Eggs and Bones
- Salt and Salty Snacks
- Xylitol a sweetner found in gum, candy, baked goods, and toothpaste
- Yeast Dough

Chemicals, Cleaners and Cosmetics

Keep all medicines, cleaners, chemicals, cosmetics and plants, seeds and bulbs out of sight and reach of pets. This includes the following:

• Essential Oils and Oil-Based Fresheners



- Aspirin, Ibuprofen and Naproxen
- Adderall
- Topical Creams and Ointments
- All Nicotine Products, including e-cigarette liquids and parts
- Inspect Repellents containing DEET
- Guerilla Glue Products
- NOTE: Teflon heated to high temperatures may cause death in birds.

Pets and COVID 19

To date, the CDC has not received any reports of pets becoming ill with COVID 19. Neither is there current evidence to support that humans can contract COVID 19 from their pets. Nonetheless, it is recommended that you limit contact with your pets if you are experiencing any of the COVID 19 symptoms (fever over 100.4, dry cough and trouble breathing) or have been confirmed to have COVID 19.

During this time of limited resources, you may be wondering how you are going to be able to afford to feed and care for your pets. There are nonprofit organizations that are offering free services and food banks in light of the current circumstances. Be sure to check with your local animal welfare departments to locate resources.
